Rush to the Rockies 2018 was the 21st national metal detecting event put on by the Eure-ka! Treasure Hunters Club. It took place up in beautiful Pickle Gulch campground and day-use area on July 6-8. Pickle Gulch is located about 5 miles north of Black Hawk,




CO. Visitors of the tiny city of Black Hawk might feel the area is solely focused on gambling, but it is an historic mining settlement founded in 1859 during the Pike's Peak Gold Rush which made it a fitting location for a Rush to the Rockies hunt.

people spoke about some fun hunting and great finds they had recently including Stealth Digger's "Smokin' Joe" and "Just Bob". And what's a campfire without S'mores? Some people were so caught up in the captivating stories, they caught their marshmallows on fire!

At the crack of dawn on Saturday, Cindy's parking crew guided people to the lower and upper parking lots. Parking is limited in the upper lot and it took cooperation and patience to get everyone to the hunt area, but things went smoothly overall. Rush

to the Rockies 2018 was officially kicked off with greetings and announcements before everyone was sent to the Lady Liberty hunt field to get ready for the first hunt. This hunt was coordinated by Tonette Romero and consisted of 20% of the total hunt fees which equaled 3,588 coins including mostly silver dimes and war nickels.

There were also 33 tokens buried in the hunt field for prizes such as t-shirts, pouches, gift cards, silver rounds and bars and a **Garrett Ace** 400 detector.

The next hunt may have been the most fun! The Kids Hunt was planted and strewn with coins, jewelry, silver and other trinkets for the aspiring detectorist to find with bor-



rowed detectors that may have been a bit big for some of the little ones. The six participants ranged in age from 2 - 12 and got to keep their finds as well as prizes including a set of **Garrett headphones and a Garrett detector**.








The second hunt was the Liberty Bell Casino. This hunt was named for the first vari-

ation (created in 1895) of the modern mechanical slot machine we see today, originally being referred to as a "fruit machine" or "one-armed

bandit". This hunt was coordinated by Sean Miltimore and consisted of 15% of the total hunt fees

which equaled 4,635 coins including mostly clad quarters, halves and dollars as well as gaming tokens and other casino-related coins. There were also 36 tokens buried in the hunt field for prizes such as gold nuggets, gold playing cards, mini CA gold coins, gift certificates to the local casinos for dinners and night stays, and a **Minelab 505 detector**.









fees which equaled 9,065 buffalo-related coins including modern buffalo nickels, cull buffalos, cull Indian Heads, as well as some unique copper coins (some with zombie buffalos!). There were also 41 to-kens buried in the hunt field for prizes for many buffalo-related items, gold nuggets, commemorative

coin collections, and a Garrett AT Pro detector.


Much of the day was overcast, but not stormy, which was a blessing since the hunters were climbing up and down hunt fields in the forest at 9,200 feet in elevation. Saturday evening was for rest and relaxation for the exhausted hunters and volunteers. Need to recharge those batteries for two more hunts tomorrow!

Sunday morning started off with the mouth-watering smells of pancakes, sausage and coffee thanks to Flippin' Flapjacks! Kelly made pancake flippin' look so easy. She had a batter dispenser that made several pancakes in a perfect row. It was mesmerizing to watch.

Once everyone got their fill, it was off to the Wild, Wild West hunt. This hunt was coordinated by **Glen Thompson** and consisted of 20% of the total hunt fees which equaled 2,697 wild west-related coins and items including copper Indians, dateless buffalos, Indian bore relic bullets, old buttons, and large cents. There were also 31 tokens buried in the hunt field for prizes such as a 2 oz. copper nugget, a silver bullet, an old lantern, passes to Georgetown Railroad, silver bars and rounds, and a **Teknetics T2** detector.



With no rest for the weary, it was time for the final hunt of the weekend – Uncle Sam's Silver Spectacular! The temps were rising, but I think that is preferred to the hail we got last year! This hunt was coordinated by **Van Romero** and consisted of 25% of the total hunt fees which equaled 1,226 coins including silver quarters and halves, and dollars. There was a quick decision made by the hunt master that put 2 uncirculated Morgan's in the hunt! They were supposed to be token prizes so two hunters must have been very happy when those were found! There were also 36 tokens buried in the hunt field for prizes for quite a few 1



There were so many happy faces receiving some valuable prizes for all the hunts of which many were donated by our sponsors. The hunt coordinators and I were able to count, separate and store coins and prizes in the "official" Rush hunt trailer borrowed from 3R Racing which offered a secure and protected location. Also, *thanks to our*



generous sponsors, we were able to give away a detector in each hunt including the Kids Hunt and even a 7th detector that was given away to one lucky drawing winner.

Throughout Saturday and Sunday there were games, gold panning, and drawings. The Erickson's made a fun metal detecting game

where the player used tiny metal detectors to "find" targets in a "park". Each target was a push pin that revealed a symbol that may be good for a prize. The other game was a box of pebbles and if you pulled out a red pebble, you won a prize. Over the two days, there were 16 drawings for silver bullets, gold nuggets, silver flags, 1858 LL One Cent, 1715 Potent Jerusalem Cross/Shield relic, Colorado Gold Rush 1 oz. Silver Round w/ gold leaf and a giant 10 oz. silver American Flag. Gold panning was provided by volunteers from Foothills Prospectors. Eureka THC and Foothills Prospectors provided the gold that was seeded into the sand from our local creeks. Participants received assistance and were able to pan for gold and keep what they found!



There were 80 hunters that participated in the five hunts over two days. All entry fees were put in the ground which equaled 21,211 targets worth \$20,520! We had a great group of people from around the nation attending. States represented were: Kansas, California, Texas, Arizona, Nebraska, New Mexico, Florida, Missouri, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Oklahoma, Oregon, New Hampshire, Connecticut, Wyoming, and of course Colorado.

A special thanks to the many dedicated and helpful volunteers that made the event a spec-

tacular success! We must have impressed the camp hosts and forest ranger with our meticulous clean-up of the entire area since I did not hear back from the forest ranger after the event!

This is not to say the General Club Membership has no say in our Club operation. They do, just not a direct vote. There are 3 ways our General Club Membership may provide input:



In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (nonmembers may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times

during the hunt.

- 2. All hunters must wear headphones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. 


