Silver Ring with Compartment

In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (nonmembers may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression

- of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:
- 1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
- 2. All hunters must wear headphones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.

Please follow the City's guidelines and show that we, as detectorist, are a responsible group.





Treasure Puzzle

A cryptogram is an encoded message. The code used is called a simple substitution cypher. This means that the message is encoded by replacing each character in the message with a letter of the alphabet. Every time a particular character occurs in the message, it is replaced with the same code letter. Word spacing and punctuation are not changed.






Secretary's Report



Tecting Tips

Hand warmers are great for cold weather hunting. And they make a nice gift with a "thank you for your time" when asking for permission to hunt from a construction foreman on a cold day. Even if the answer was "no", the person can still change their mind or will remember you in case you are asking again at one of his next projects. Also, if the answer is "no", ask if he knows of any other similar projects going on where you could detect.

Guess Who's Coming for a Visit?

In this issue of the *Soundoff* our newsletter editor, Cindy, is reviewing a number of books about metal detecting. When I was the newsletter editor some ten years ago, a monthly book review was usually included. Among those reviews were some excellent books by Dick Stout.

Taking a magic time machine back about 10 years, Dick Stout was then a contributing editor to *Western and Eastern Treasure* (*W&ET*) magazine. His column, "Club News and Views" was a must read for me. It was the retelling of events, personalities and finds from across the country submitted by club newsletter editors such as myself. I became acquainted with Dick, and he to the Eureka! Treasure Hunters Club through this connection.

Although I knew of Dick through his many books and magazine articles, the mail and over the telephone, we had never met. Some of his many books that are still available are; *Coin Hunting in Depth, Where to Find Treasure* and *Metal Detecting, The Hobby.* (shameless plug – all are available on the book shelves of Gold -N-Detectors). Dick and I kept in touch, largely through e-mail. Let me tell you something of Dick's pedigree.

Dick Stout is deeply involved in the hobby of metal detecting and has written a number of excellent books on the subject. Earlier in his career though, he was a professional musician -a guitarist with the Glenn Miller band. Later, he was employed by a number of metal detector manufacturers. The last such employment necessitated his moving to Texas where he now resides. Dick was the impetus and founder of the Federation of Metal Detecting and Archaeological Clubs (FMDAC) in 1984. Many of us are members of FMDAC. As mentioned, Dick wrote a column for *W&ET* for a number of years before retiring. He has recently been a featured guest on the American Digger talk show moderated by our own Jeff Lubbert. Dick continues to stay active with travelling and his blog Stout Standards. http://www.stoutstandards.wordpress.com/

Returning with our time machine to present day, I was greatly surprised and pleased to return home one Sunday afternoon after planting Lulu's Bling as Margaret handed me a note that said, "Dick Stout would like for you to call." What a treat! I called Dick back to learn that he was in the Denver area. You will want to read Dick's story, "My Rocky Mountain High," in the September 2014 archive of his blog. Just click on the story "Time in Grade". Then click on "My Rocky Mountain High" to read about his visit to Colorado.

Dick and his daughter came by Gold -N- Detectors that very afternoon. After introductions, we retired upstairs to the "intergalactic corporate headquarters". I had been able to reach only two of my hunting buddies, Cliff McGaughey and Louise Smyth both of whom met us at the office. Upstairs, surrounded by the hundreds of books in my library, we talked about, what else, metal detecting! A lot of the conversation was about research and researchers, finds, trips and the study of history. What a great afternoon! 
