# The Prez Sez By Ron Erickson

Do you pick up pennies? The other day I was walking across yards that were more dirt than grass and was seeing a lot of pennies that have been uncovered due to all the rain. I started picking them up not for their value but just to see how many I would find in a day.

Most detectorists I know track them in their coin count when out hunting and will dig down 5 or 6 inches to recover them, but will you pick them up off the floor or side walk?

While at work I was watching a training session on a new piece of locating equipment. The trainer was trying to show how to locate an electric line and how the equipment should find the line under-

ground. Well, the trouble they were having was starting with the unknown. Not knowing for certain where the line was located made it hard to show how the machine reacts to the buried line they were trying to find. It is far easier if you know how the machine reacts to a known line and apply it to finding an unknown line.

In metal detecting the same applies. If you know how your machine will react to a known target you will have a better chance of finding the target in the WILD. So, test your machine on the known item then look for it in the WILD. I have learned that this really applies to lost earrings. After spending time looking for the lost one, I tested the known one and found my machine was not set up the find it. So take the time to test your targets and you will increase your finds.

A cryptogram is an encoded message. The code used is called a simple substitution cypher. **Gold:** Natural gold (flakes, nuggets, wire) stamped karat alloy content or obvious custom alloy item.

<u>Jewelry</u>: objects of metal often set with gems and worn for personal adornment, except jewelry qualifying for the GOLD category.

 $\underline{\textbf{Coin}}$ : a piece of metal issued by governmental authority as money (includes GOLD coins of any nation).

<u>Token</u>: a piece resembling a coin issued as money by some person or body not of a governmental authority; can be redeemed for services or specified items.

**<u>Artifact</u>**: simple object showing human workmanship or modification.



As a Eureka! member we want you to participate in and help put on In-Town club hunts. These hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- The hunt master for any particular hunt can decide open hunt (non-members may hunt) or members only.
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, <u>MUST</u> enforce all rules, including:

- 1. Pouches to store finds and trash MUST be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
- 2. All hunters must wear headphones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open. A first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt.
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

## My First Cache

This property seemed barren. Did the 1906 Littleton house have anybody live there that ever went outside? Did any kids ever live there? The yard gave up a few items that would indicate that is had not been detected including a few coins but no old ones. Under the old long clothes line looked so promising, but nothing there either. hope still for a quarter and hopefully a silver one, I rechecked the hole. Another key, this one was tiny. My Pinpointer went off again. Another key. I was six inches deep at this point and then I hit a pile of keys:



twelve more keys. My First Cache!

Meanwhile, a neighbor had stopped over to see how I was doing. He watched me pull up the batch of keys. I showed him my finds and said I was going to run my detector over the hole to see if I missed any. I still got a signal, so went back to

pinpointing and found a few more keys. Each time I thought I had found them all, I would get another signal. Finally, the ground was quiet.

It turned out that I dug
167 keys. Although the
