April Hunt Report

During the April meeting the vast majority of the people in attendance voted to move the date of the scheduled hunt from April 15th to April 22nd due to predicted nasty weather. We voted by a show of hands and we had about 40 people say that they would attend the hunt if it was held on the 22nd as opposed to the 3 that said they would be at the hunt if we held it on Saturday the 14th. With a vote like that it made for an easy decision. On the originally scheduled hunt date the weather was better than predicted but still nowhere near as nice as it was on

the 22nd. So it appears that we made a good choice in postponing the hunt for a week.

We had 27 people show up and pay the \$4.15 entry fee to enjoy this hunt. The hunt began at 1:00 with a brief description of the rules. There were three separate hunt fields: hunt field 1 had over 600 cents scattered throughout both memorial and wheat pennies, hunt field 2 had Indian head pennies secreted away within its boundaries, and hunt field 3 had large cents and flying eagle cents just under the surface. The hunters needed to find six wheat pennies in order to move to the hunt field with the Indian head pennies. Then they needed to find three Indian head pennies to move into the large cent/ flying eagle cent field. Once in the LC/FE cent field they were allowed to find only one of those planted targets and then they had to start over in the wheat cent field and start over from scratch in order to work their way back up to the LC/FE cent field.

The hunt started about 15 after the hour due to the fact that we didn't want to plant too many of the large cents or flying eagle cents so Joe Koch and I planted those after everybody checked in. We began with a perimeter start around hunt field 1. This hunt field should have been bigger but we were limited in space at this location of the park. In a rapid fashion the hunters started gathering the pennies. Within a couple of minutes people started to make their way towards Joe and I to make sure they had the proper number of wheat pennies. There were a few people that didn't hear me properly and thought that any 6 pennies moved them into the Indian Head field. I reiterated that it took 6 wheaties for them to move on and sent these misconstrued people back to

searching for wheaties.

These targets were not recovered till after the hunt was declared over and open hunting was allowed. Boot Lewis found the SyderCo bug and Richard Kibler recovered the mini knife.

I heard several compliments during and after the hunt so I hope that everybody had a good time. I would like to thank Joe Koch for his help in planning and running this hunt. Without Joe's help this hunt would have been impossible to pull off.


TREASURE HUNTER'S CODE OF ETHICS

In 1859, Gold nuggets and gold dust were used for commerce in the Territory of Jefferson, later to be renamed Colorado, because there was no other medium of exchange. Gold dust brokers paid \$12 to \$16 an ounce, and there were many abus-

es. It was impossibly difficult to transport gold to Philadelphia and equally impossible to transport coins from Philadelphia back to Colorado because of the danger and likelihood of stagecoach robbery. To improve these conditions, the Clark brothers, Austin and Milton, along with Emanuel H. Gruber became bankers, brokers, assayers, and minters in Denver, and in July of 1860 the firm struck four denominations. Christopher Marchase will share the story.



In-Town Hunt Schedule

As a Eureka member we want you to participate in and help put on In-Town club hunts. These hunts are ment to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- The hunt master for any particular hunt can decide open hunt (non-members may hunt) or members only.
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash MUST be worn and used at all

times during the hunt.

- 2. All hunters must wear headphones.
- 3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open. A first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt.
- 4. Hunters digging and leaving trash on the hunt field should receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

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
