





Loretto Heights Artifacts Delivered by HART

The Historical Artifact Recovery Team (HART) has concluded its three-year project of working with the real estate developers at Loretto Heights, the Catholic girls' school dating back to 1891. The property in Southwest Denver is now being carefully developed for residential and commercial purposes. The first residential lofts will be available for lease very soon.

Between December 2018 and October 2021, HART conducted searches of the large 70-acre site in Southwest Denver on 13 separate occasions. 23 HART members participated in at least two of those searches.

HART unearthed a wide variety of amazing historical artifacts. Some have been shown at previous Eureka club meetings. On all of our projects, HART provides a community service and gives the artifacts we recover to the institution or group we are assisting, to be used for their research or display.

Dan Pierson, Chris Davis, Sue Ruggles and I spent a good deal of time organizing all of the Loretto Heights




artifacts. We segregated the objects into related types, and marked and placed them into plastic Ziploc bags. We filled two large, sturdy cardboard banker's boxes, one of which was devoted to glass items cleaned by Dan. We put the particularly interesting small items such as old coins, medallions and jewelry into two shadowboxes donated by Chris.

Dan, Sue and I delivered everything on March 29, 2022 to Mark Witkiewicz and Paige Langley of Westside Investment Partners, the Loretto Heights developers. We met at the magnificent red sandstone Administration Building which is the centerpiece of the property. Mark and Paige were very impressed and happy with HART's work and results. The developers will decide on an appropriate way to display the artifacts and will give full credit to Eureka Treasure Hunters Club and HART.

After our meeting Mark and Paige offered to give us a tour of the unique, historic building and bell tower. It was a great chance to see the inside of the structure, including the beautiful chapel. It's a surprisingly long way to the top of the tower, and the 2X4 wooden stairs as you approach the upper part are rickety. The old bell is still up there and the area is breezy and open, giving a stunning view of Denver in all directions. Thanks to Dan Pierson for his photos of our meeting and tour.

The Loretto Heights project was clearly one of the most extensive and significant HART activities ever. My sincere thank you goes out to each HART member who participated and contributed to making this project a total success! Terrific job everyone!





















Scrabble Scramble Rules


One hundred percent of the entry fees will be converted into silver and modern coins and planted. There will also be two standard Scrabble sets of tiles planted (200 tiles). (A standard Scrabble set contains 100 tiles as show above.) Each tile will be attached to a modern zinc penny. Tiles have a point value assigned, blank tiles can be used as any letter and have a zero point value.

At the end of the hunt, participants will have fifteen minutes to make words with the highest point value. Hunters may only use tiles they have recovered themselves. NO TRADING OR COMBINING TILES. Tiles making the highest point words will be turned over to the hunt master for validation. Foreign words and proper nouns are not allowed. Any disputes will be resolved with the Merriam-Webster Official SCRABBLE Players Dictionary (Sixth Edition) which will be available for reference.

Prizes will be awarded to the hunter making words with the highest point value. In the case of a tie on points, the word with the most letters will win. If still tied, winner will decided by a coin flip. Hunters can win multiple prizes but each tile may only be used once.

<u>Jewelry</u>: objects of metal often set with gems and worn for personal adornment, except jewelry qualifying for the Gold Category.

Coin: a piece of metal issued by governmental authority as money.

<u>Token</u>: a piece resembling a coin issued by some person or entity, not of a governmental authority (with the exception of tax tokens), that could be redeemed for services or specified items. Advertisement tokens with no redeemable value are entered in the Artifact Category.

<u>Artifact</u>: simple object showing human workmanship or modification, and all other items that do not meet the criteria for other categories.






